The colored boys will sing spirituals, for which they are becoming distinguished, and Thomas McDowell, who won the championship in oratory at the county field meet in April, will speak on "The Colored People's Debt to Lincoln."

From 4 to 5 p.m. the Chattanooga High school state champion band will a concert on the campus. Exhibits of talent in art, sewing, as well as stor in manual art, will be displayed. All visitors are requested to register at the entrance. The public generally, both white and colored is invited.
